Invoices and bills were pasted in books of great size of the scrapbook or memorabilia type and are the other side of the negotiations recorded in Hill's financial tomes, especially those labeled "Cash". Grocery bills and other invoices of provisions are very numerous and itemized in detail: milk garden stuff, butter, &c. Hides, skins and furs (both those from the farm and those purchased) are billed or receipted. Northcote and, especially Humboldt Farm bills and receipts, particularly for great quantities of wheat, are represented. Hill's household bills and receipts take up much of the space. Taxes, lands owned by Hill, farm expenditures of all kinds, cattle information, names of farm employes and superintendents, road taxes, usually worked out by farm hands, firewood cut on the farm, hay harvests, etc. receive much attention both in bills and receipts and accompanying letters.
