"For some years we have had a number of Japanese workmen on our railway. Many of them started as track laborers and are now working in the round-houses and machine shops, doing their work well and receiving good rates of pay. We have at present twelve hundred to fourteen hundred Japanese workmen employed on the road and would be glad to make it three thousand. . . For all our track gangs we have built special houses where the men can make themselves comfortable. Many of these men have
