I would be glad to help Mr. Frasers young friend, but for the cold winter and long office hours (8 to 12 and 1 to 6 and sometimes later) would be harder on him than the shorter hours of New York. He should spend his time in the open air.

I note what you say ab Mr. Angus making no charge for services as Tustee and wrote you

about this th my last. I notice Manitoba has freen falling off for a few days past and am not at all surprised as it seems an impression has got abroad that a special Dividend would be declared Jany 1St of 25%. Several Eastern parties have written to friends here asking when spcl dividend would be paid &c. I have told those who came to me about it that no such dividend had been discussed by the Board.Several quite large blocks of stock held here have been sold most of them at 165, and some of the parties are going in again if it drops to less than 160. I would like to see our stock hold at about 150 or 155 and remain more steady as the slow movement of the crop and other reasons may make a tight money market when all stocks held on margin
