Recently (month to 6 weeks) we have had difficulties in finding cars enough to supply deman on our lines and supply of cars and receipts o cars at Minneapolis and Duluth is greater than the elevators at those points can unload." Hav had in both those places from a thousand to 1500 cars constantly waiting to be unloaded.Ou grain car equipment is sufficient to move the entire crop raisde on all our lines in 10 roun trips & it is not our fault if the cars are no handled by consignees with greater dispatch."

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
