Seeking a Pass For the Manitoba's Pacific Extension.

Winnipeg, Man. April 29, 1886
Major Rogers, the enter who located the

Canadian Pacific, partition through here to-day on his way to the Rolling ountains, commissioned by President Hill to select a pass for his proposed extension of the Manitoba road from Devil's Lake to the Pacific. The line will follow the Missouri from Buford to the junction of the Milk, and along the latter to Fort Assiniboine. From that point it will continue West till the Marais [sic] River is reached. This will be followed through the mountains, it being the present intention to adapt the Marais Pass unless a more suitable [one] is discovered by Major Rogers.
