Hill to R. B. Angus

"I wired you today that Rogers had found two passes thro' the Rocky Mountains via the 'Kicking Horse' and the 'Kananaskis' and had left for the west side of the Columbia River. I now enclose you copies of letters from Rodgers[sic] and Burdick which came today. Re Garden's man sent by Shepard and Langdon on trip as far west as Moose Jaw and his experiences and reports on a find countryside. He kept a record of the force on the grading: 76 teams, 122 men not including supply teams. All in all his report justifies our choice of the more southern route.
