Am glad you had so good an opportunity to go over them [Can.Pac. Road matters] with Sir John [MacDonald]. The land matters will soon take very definite shape and nothing is more sure than that the [Dominion] Govt will from 10 -15,000,000 acres short of the amount granted to the CancPac. therefore it is of the greatest consequence to us to have the basis upon which this shortage is to be settled agreed upon." Hill then takes up C.P.'s low tariff rates compared with those of the "Pacific" roads (cost of coal \$7.50 coered to \$2.00 and \$2.50 "Poor old Major Rodge: ic] has redeemed his promise and the pass through the Selkirks is better than the Nor Pacific, and with the further great advantage of saving the Tunnell[sic It is hard to estimate the value of this pass to our enterprise.
