The wet country that Smith passed over has become further rains, more entirely covered with water on the East side over a foot deep. Windmills put up at the pumps along the line work slowly and train are badly delayed for want of water. I suggest steam pumps as they would not cost any more to build or operate at places where there is a man kept to pile wood, and I think they will use them.
