In the school years and shortly thereafter there is much corresp ondence with classmate and school friends, such as Mark Reeves. Edwin O.Holter, Sheldon Cary, Oliver Nicola, Francis Bishop, "Pudge" Heffelfinger, F. E. Barbour, etc In addition there are letters from men who late were prominent in L.W.H.'s life: George T.Slade Edward Tuck, H. O. Northcote, Lord Mount Stephen and Lord Strathcona. There is in 1895 a copy of Frederic Law Olmstead's account of the supposed Capt. Kidd treasure on his island (Deer Is.) in Maine and its connection with John Jacob Astor. The Gotzian family of St. Paul receive attention in the correspondence (Harriet Gotzian Tighe). One learns much of prominent girls' finishing schools in New York city and environs.
