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World War II Correspondences

Throughout World War II (1941-1945), letters written between soldiers and their loved ones depict how the war was perceived in the United States. This collection consists of letters written by a soldier, Anthony Sohorowich, stationed at an army base in Santa Ana, CA, to his family. **G**

Minneapolis School Desegregation

Following the mandated desegregation of public schools in 1954, a widespread debate began about how to integrate schools. Our collection includes letters written by parents on either side of the debate regarding the use of busing as a tool of integration. Many of these relate to the pairing of Field and Hale schools in 1971.

Scandinavian Immigrants in MN

Scandinavian immigrants contribute to the rich, diverse history of Minnesota by bringing their unique stories and cultures. These collections include the autobiographies and diaries of a Swedish immigrant couple and photographs from a Norwegian immigrant family in Minnesota.

Publications on Black Minnesotans

As the Civil Rights and Black Power movements swept through the United States in the midtwentieth century, activists and organizations made efforts to document African American history and life. Our collections include pamphlets, magazines, and other publications by the Minnesota Historical Society, the University of Minnesota, and *Topic* magazine (African American periodical) from the 1940s to 1980s, as well as a project by students at Webster Open School in the 1990s. **UM, NA, DPLA**

Spanish American War Photography

The Spanish American War (1898-1902) was the first U.S. war to use photography and film to document the conflict, which influenced how Americans perceived the war. Our photography collections from soldiers stationed in the Philippines depict the violence of war, the everyday life of soldiers, and the life and culture of Filipinos. **MDL**
